4-3(D)(2)(a) This use shall comply with all applicable City, State, and federal regulations. This use must obtain all applicable State and Federal permits and/or approvals for this activity and comply with the terms of those permits and approvals throughout the duration of the use.

This use must comply with air quality permitting requirements 4-3(D)(2)(b) pusuant to Part 9-5 of ROA 1994 (Air Quality and Environmental Health Control).

Any outdoor compost pile shall be limited to 6 feet in height and 4-3(D)(2)(c) shall be located a minimum of 50 feet in any direction of any Residential zone district or any lot containing a residential use in any Mixed-use zone district.

4-3(D)(2)(d) Compost bins shall be located a minimum of 50 feet in any direction of any Residential zone district or any lot containing a residential use in any Mixed-use zone district.

Explanation

Revised to include composting as an incidental permitted activity.

CHANGE / IDO TEXT

Community Garden

A private or public facility for cultivation of fruits, flowers, vegetables, or ornamental plants, including composting as an incidental activity, by more than one person or household family as a primary use of land. See also Composting Facility.

Garden

An area of land managed and maintained as an accessory use of land to cultivate fruits, flowers, vegetables, or ornamental plants, including composting as an incidental activity, for personal or group use, consumption, or donation. See also Composting Facility.

WILL THIS IMPACT HOME COMPOSTING OR COMMUNITY GARDENS?

Definition

Composting Facility

A facility operated by more than one person or household that receives organic material to generate compost.

Composting Facility is divided into 3 categories based on the size of the premises.

- 1. Small: 21,870 square feet (1/2 acre) or less.
- 2. Medium: Between 21,780 square feet (½ acre) and 2 acres.
- 3. Large: 2 or more acres.

Community Garden and Garden (accessory use) definitions updated to permissively allow composting.



Definition specifies "more than one person or household" to exempt individual households

Community Garden

A private or public facility for cultivation of fruits, flowers, vegetables, or ornamental plants, including composting as an incidental activity, by more than one person or household family as a primary use of land. See also Composting Facility.

Garden

An area of land managed and maintained as an accessory use of land to cultivate fruits, flowers, vegetables, or ornamental plants, including composting as an incidental activity, for personal or group use, consumption, or donation. See also Composting Facility.

WHAT ABOUT NEIGHBORS THAT USE A SHARED COMPOST FACILITY?

If composting is part of a community garden → No change to how this use is regulated

Community Garden

A private or public facility for cultivation of fruits, flowers, vegetables, or ornamental plants, including composting as an incidental activity, by more than one person or household family as a primary use of land. See also Composting

Facility.

Even a small planting area may meet the definition of a Community Garden.

If composting is **NOT** part of a community garden → **Regulated as a small/medium composting facility**

- 4-3(D)(2)(d) Compost bins shall be located a minimum of 50 feet in any direction of any Residential zone district or any lot containing a residential use in any Mixed-use zone district.
- 4-3(D)(2)(e) If this use is within 500 feet in any direction of any Residential zone district or lot containing a residential use in any Mixed-use zone district, customer visits and deliveries shall be prohibited between 10:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M.

WILL THIS MAKE IT MORE DIFFICULT TO COMPOST IN THE CITY?

- No. This change is intended to support commercial and industrial composting by making it clear where the use is allowed and what regulations apply.
- Defining the uses creates clarity and predictability.
- Establishing use-specific standards helps prevent negative impacts.
- The intent is to expand opportunities for composting and to support the City's sustainability goals.

WHY ARE COMPOSTING FACILITIES DEFINED BY SITE ACREAGE RATHER THAN COMPOST VOLUME?

- Enforcement feasibility: Code Enforcement can verify the size of the site, but cannot easily measure compost volume during inspections.
- Operational variability: Compost volume can change depending on how the site is managed.
- Indirect volume control: Other zoning standards, like pile height limits and setbacks limit how much compost a site can handle.
- City scale planning: Regulating by site acreage helps us understand how different types of facilities fit on typical city lots.
